

The Lord Jesus Shepherds His Church on Earth by the Ministry of the Gospel

The Lord rebukes and removes "the shepherds who destroy and scatter the sheep" (Jer. 23:1). He gathers the flock, brings them back to the fold and sets "shepherds over them who will care for them" (Jer. 23:3–4). He raises up the Son of David, the great Good Shepherd, to "reign as king and deal wisely" (Jer. 23:5). He is "our righteousness," in whom we "dwell securely" (Jer. 23:6). He has compassion on all of us, who were "like sheep without a shepherd" (Mark 6:34). Not only does He teach us many things, but taking the bread, He blesses and breaks and gives it to the disciples "to set before the people" (Mark 6:41). He abundantly provides for His Church on earth, so that everyone is fed and fully satisfied in body and soul. He preaches peace "to you who were far off," and "by the blood of Christ," He brings you near (Eph. 2:13, 17). Though you were "separated from Christ" by your sin, "having no hope and without God in the world" (Eph. 2:12), now "you are fellow citizens with the saints and members of the household of God" (Eph. 2:19).

REMEMBERING YOUR BAPTISM

(For Children and Adult Alike)

It is in and through our baptism into Christ Jesus that we have been made children of God and made members of the Body of Christ, the Church. The font at the entrance of the nave reminds us of this gift and grace of God. As part of your own spiritual discipline you might remember your baptism as you enter in to worship God, who has brought you from death to life in his Son, Jesus Christ; and then again as you leave, as a reminder that by His grace, you are called to love and serve the world in His name. Remembering your baptism is as easy as dipping your thumb in the water and making a cross on your forehead. Or alternately, by dipping your right middle finger into the water and making the cross by touching first your head, then lifting your finger from your head and touching your chest just below the sternum, then lifting your finger from your sternum to touch the left side of your chest, then lifting your finger from touching the left side of your chest to touch the right side of your chest.

In this simple gesture you're reminded that in the living waters of baptism you were purchased with the very blood of Christ by which your sins were forgiven and you were granted life and salvation. St. Paul writes in Colossians:

In Christ the whole fullness of deity dwells bodily....you have been filled in him.... having been buried with him in baptism, in which you were also raised with him through faith in the powerful working of God, who raised him from the dead...you were dead in your trespasses but God made you alive together with him, having forgiving you all your trespasses, by canceling the record of debt that stood against you with its legal demands. This he set aside, nailing it to the cross. (2:9-10)

Martin Luther said that there was no greater comfort on earth than one's baptism:

"We must boldly and without fear hold fast to our baptism, and set it high against all sins and terrors of conscience. We must humbly admit, 'I know full well that I cannot do a single thing that is pure. But I am baptized, and through my baptism God, who cannot lie, has bound himself in a covenant with me. He will not count my sin against me, but will slay it and blot it out.'" Luther's Works Vol. 35, page 36.

FIRST READING Jeremiah 23:1–6

Jeremiah prophesied before the exile in 587 bce. In this passage, he uses the metaphor of a shepherd to describe the bad kings who have scattered the "flock" of Israel. God promises to gather the flock and to raise up a new king from David's line to save Israel and Judah.

"Woe to the shepherds who destroy and scatter the sheep of my pasture!" declares the LORD. ² Therefore thus says the LORD, the God of Israel, concerning the shepherds who care for my people: "You have scattered my flock and have driven them away, and you have not attended to them. Behold, I will attend to you for your evil deeds, declares the LORD. ³ Then I will gather the remnant of my flock out of all the countries where I have driven them, and I will bring them back to their fold, and they shall be fruitful and multiply. ⁴ I will set shepherds over them who will care for them, and they shall fear no more, nor be dismayed, neither shall any be missing, declares the LORD.

⁵ "Behold, the days are coming, declares the LORD, when I will raise up for David a righteous Branch, and he shall reign as king and deal wisely, and shall execute justice and righteousness in the land. ⁶ In his days Judah will be saved, and Israel will dwell securely. And this is the name by which he will be called: 'The LORD is our righteousness.'

SECOND READING

Ephesians 2:11–22

The author of this letter is reminding his audience that originally they were not part of God's chosen people. Through Jesus' death, however, they are included in God's household of faith, whose cornerstone is Jesus Christ.

11 Therefore remember that at one time you Gentiles in the flesh, called "the uncircumcision" by what is called the circumcision, which is made in the flesh by hands—¹² remember that you were at that time separated from Christ, alienated from the commonwealth of Israel and strangers to the covenants of promise, having no hope and without God in the world. 13 But now in Christ Jesus you who once were far off have been brought near by the blood of Christ. 14 For he himself is our peace, who has made us both one and has broken down in his flesh the dividing wall of hostility 15 by abolishing the law of commandments expressed in ordinances, that he might create in himself one new man in place of the two, so making peace, ¹⁶ and might reconcile us both to God in one body through the cross, thereby killing the hostility. ¹⁷ And he came and preached peace to you who were far off and peace to those who were near. 18 For through him we both have access in one Spirit to the Father. 19 So then you are no longer strangers and aliens, but you are fellow citizens with the saints and members of the household of God, ²⁰ built on the foundation of the apostles and prophets, Christ Jesus himself being the cornerstone, ²¹ in whom the whole structure, being joined together, grows into a holy temple in the Lord. ²² In him you also are being built together into a dwelling place for God by the Spirit.

When Jesus sent his disciples out to teach and heal, they ministered among large numbers of people. Their work was motivated by Christ's desire to be among those in need.

³⁰ The apostles returned to Jesus and told him all that they had done and taught. ³¹ And he said to them, "Come away by yourselves to a desolate place and rest a while." For many were coming and going, and they had no leisure even to eat. ³² And they went away in the boat to a desolate place by themselves. 33 Now many saw them going and recognized them, and they ran there on foot from all the towns and got there ahead of them. ³⁴ When he went ashore he saw a great crowd, and he had compassion on them, because they were like sheep without a shepherd. And he began to teach them many things. ³⁵ And when it grew late, his disciples came to him and said, "This is a desolate place, and the hour is now late. ³⁶ Send them away to go into the surrounding countryside and villages and buy themselves something to eat." ³⁷ But he answered them, "You give them something to eat." And they said to him, "Shall we go and buy two hundred denarii worth of bread and give it to them to eat?" 38 And he said to them. "How many loaves do you have? Go and see." And when they had found out, they said, "Five, and two fish." ³⁹ Then he commanded them all to sit down in groups on the green grass. 40 So they sat down in groups, by hundreds and by fifties. 41 And taking the five loaves and the two fish, he looked up to heaven and said a blessing and broke the loaves and gave them to the disciples to set before the people. And he divided the two fish among them all. ⁴² And they all ate and were satisfied. ⁴³ And they took up twelve baskets full of broken pieces and of the fish. 44 And those who ate the loaves were five thousand men.

COMMEMORATIONS FOR THE WEEK

Monday - July 22, 2024 Mary Magdalene, Apostle

Mary of Magdala, called "the apostle to the Apostles" by Bernard of Clairvaux, carried the news of the resurrection to the Twelve. Whenever the Gospels list the women who were with Jesus, Mary Magdalene is listed first (John 19:25 is the sole exception). perhaps because she was the first to see the risen Jesus. Luke 8:2 reports that Jesus had cured her of possession by seven demons. She has often in the West, but not in the East, been identified with the repentant "woman of the city" who anointed Jesus' feet as he sat at the table in the Pharisee's home (Luke 7:36-50), and her title on the medieval calendar was "Penitent". There has been no one else with this title. There is, however, no biblical basis for this identification of Mary with the repentant prostitute. Nor is she to be identified with Mary of Bethany (John 12:3), an identification common in the Western church since the 6th century, although it is rejected in the East. According to the Gospels, "the holy myrrh-bearer and equal of the Apostles, Mary Magdalene," as her title in the Eastern Church describes her, is the primary witness of the fundamental facts of the Christian proclamation: she was the death of Jesus, she saw his burial, she saw his first resurrection appearance. Her commemoration on July 22nd is observed in both East and West, and especially since the 12th century, she has been one of the most widely commemorated women in Christendom. Her witness contrasts to that of the apostles, who, at Jesus' crucifixion, "all deserted him and fled." (Matt. 26:56)

Tuesday - July 23, 2024 Birgitta of Sweden, renewer of the church, died 1373

Birgitta was born in 1303, the daughter of the chief judge or governor of the province of Upland in Sweden. On several occasions in her childhood, Birgitta had dreams of Christ crucified and of Mary his mother. Her own mother died when Birgitta was twelve. At age thirteen Birgitta was married to Ulf Gundarsson, the young son of the lawman of West Gothland. The marriage was a happy one. They had four sons and four daughter, one of whom, Katarina was venerated as St. Katherine of Vadstena (died 1381). About 1335, Birgitta, who by virtue of her father's and her husband's positions moved in the highest circles of the realm, was called to be the principal lady-in-waiting to the newly married queen of Sweden, Blanche of Namur. At the court, Lady Birgitta became known for her remarkable dreams and her strong denunciation of wickedness in court life. Such fearless denunciation was typical of Birgitta's actions throughout her life in dealing with high officials in church and state. After the death of her youngest son, Birgitta began a series of pilgrimages from 1341-1342. After her husband's death in 1344, Birgitta began to live a more ascetic life, her visions became stronger and more

dominant in her life, and she devoted more of her time and efforts to helping the needy of Sweden and later of Rome. She continued her criticisms and warning to kings and popes and tried to make peace between warring rulers. In 1351, Birgitta founded the Order of the Holy Savior, commonly called the Brigittines, centered on the monastery she started at Vadstena in Sweden in accordance with the instructions she had received in a vision. The order consisted of monks and nuns, governed by an abbess. St. Birgitta is best known for her *Revelations*, which are still read throughout Western Christendom. The *Revelations* concern chiefly the sufferings of the Savior and judgments on persons and events. A journey to the Holy Land by Birgitta and three of her children in May of 1371. Shortly after her return from Rome in 1373, she died. The Society of St. Birgitta, founded in 1920, is composed of clergy and laity within the Church of Sweden inspired by her life and *Revelations*, and who seek more frequent celebration of the Eucharist, observance of daily prayer, biblical preaching and teaching in accord with the creeds of the Church.

Thursday - July 25, 2024 James, Apostle

James the Elder or the Great was born in Galilee and was, like his father Zebedee and his brother John and the Apostle Peter and Andrew, a fisherman. He is believed to have been older than his brother, hence his title "the elder". Shortly after calling Andrew and Peter from their fishing to be disciples, Jesus saw the sons of Zebedee in a boat with their father, mending nets. He called them, and they left their father and followed him. James and his brother were called Boanerges, "sons of thunder" (Mark 3:17), presumably because of their impetuous spirit and flashing temper. (Luke 9:49, 54; Mark 10:37) Incidents in St. James's life are recorded in all four Gospels and in the book of Acts. As a member with Peter and John of the privileged "inner circle" of disciples, John witnessed the cure of Peter's mother -in-law (Lk 4:38-39) and the raising of the daughter of Jairus (Mk 5:37), and was with Jesus at the Transfiguration and at his suffering in Gethsemane on the night of his arrest. James was apparently an active leader in the early church, although there is no reliable information on where he preached or what he did. He was the first of the apostles to die a martyrs death and the only apostle whose death is recorded in the Bible. He was beheaded by Herod Agrippa I (Acts 12:2) just before Passover in 43 or 44.



The Service Extension Advisory Council offers emergency short-term assistance for rent, utilities, food, and other needs. They also conduct the annual Red Kettle Campaign at Christmas as well as Angel Tree, Tools for Schools, and Community Care Programs.

A word to those visiting the congregation: Welcome to Peace Lutheran Church! We want you to know how important you are to God and to this congregation. Please help us learn who you are by signing the guest book in the narthex and or fill out one of the green member information cards located in the hymn rack in the pew and dropping it the offering plate.

The Sacrament of Holy Communion: We celebrate communion weekly and on all festivals. ALL who are baptized in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit and believe that Christ's body and blood are truly present in, with, and under the bread and wine of Holy Communion are welcome to receive the sacrament at the Lord's invitation regardless of your denominational affiliation. Please indicate that you have communed by marking the appropriate box on the information card located in the hymnal rack. At the appropriate time the ushers will direct to come forward for communion. You may kneel at the altar rail if you are able. As you commune, [1] receive the host (bread), [2] take a prefilled glass of wine from the tray or drink from the chalice, and [3] if you have taken an individual glass of wine, place your empty glass in the tray. The benefits of the sacrament are the forgiveness of sins, life, and salvation. May God's grace fill you as you share in his supper!

Children's Worship Bulletin: There is a children's activity bulletin located on the credence table as you enter the nave. Please feel free to take one for your child.

Restrooms: The restrooms are located in the hallway off the fellowship hall and kitchen or the hallway just to the right of the nave and across from the nursery.

Nursery: Infants and children are welcome and expected in worship to participate as fully as they are able and to be instructed in the faith by their parents. However, if you and or your child is in need of a time out from the assembly, a staffed nursery is provided. The nursery is located just outside the door which is on the right hand side of the nave.
